Administrative Council

The Solid Rock Administrative Council met March 15. The Staff-Parish Committee reported that they have had much discussion regarding the position of youth director and whether it should continue as a part-time position or be expanded to a full-time position. The committee sought input from Administrative Council. A lengthy discussion followed, with many members expressing a desire to expand this area of ministry, but concerned that the cost of funding this position would exceed current giving. Council agreed to bring this opportunity before the congregation to determine if this is a ministry that congregants would support through increased giving.

The Building/Site Team reported that the survey of the building site and test borings have been completed. Finalization of the purchase from Heritage Pointe is in process. The purchase price is \$25,000 for approximately 10 acres. The plan will be submitted to the Indiana Conference for approval.

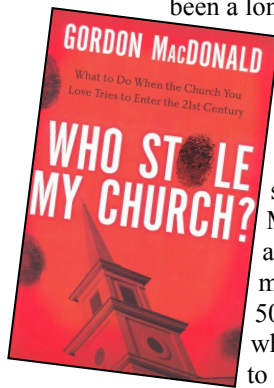

The Solid Rock Book Club will begin its spring session on April 26, reading and discussing the book *Who Stole My Church?: What to Do When the Church You Love Tries to Enter the 21st Century* by Gordon MacDonald.

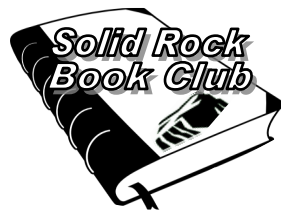
Publishers Weekly says of this book: "MacDonald charts new territory in church growth books by turning what could have been a long list of dos and



don'ts into a highly readable, even novelistic, approach to the subject. With himself as narrator, MacDonald creates a cast of church members in their 50s, 60s and 70s who meet each week to discuss where

their church has been, is now and should go in the future. 'All I know is that someone stole my church and I'd like to get it back,' says one. MacDonald delves into the feelings of the older generation as they watch new leadership take over, see changes in music and use of technology, and begin to wonder how they will fit in. He challenges their understanding of what the church is, then looks at the early church and the modern church and the many cultural influences that transform Christian spirituality. MacDonald is especially strong

when he includes young people's perspectives or brings research to bear on how people view and act on change. This is a challenging, innovative approach to a delicate subject. It's sure to benefit church leaders and members of all ages who dream of a reinvented church."

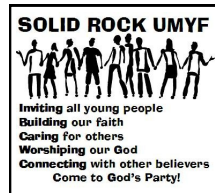

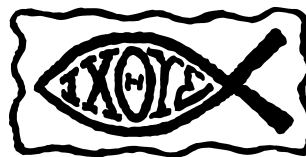


The Fish

The fish is used as a frequent title in inscriptions of the early church. The Greek letters for "fish" are formed acrostically by the Greek for "Jesus Christ, the Son of God, Savior." The symbol is also connected with baptism (converts, as small fish, follow the main fish).

A symbol of a fish was also a means of relaying a message. It could mean either a funeral was about to occur or that Christians were meeting for the sacrament of communion. According to historical records of the early church, the fish symbol displayed outside a pagan home meant someone had died. If the fish sign appeared outside a Christian home, it was a secret message that Christians were invited to come and share in the celebration of the Lord's Supper at night in secret.

The Easter Lily

The lily that blooms around Easter is a symbol of Christ's resurrection because it rises from a seemingly lifeless bulb decaying in the ground. It is also used as a symbol of Christ himself. The lily, a symbol of purity, is often used to represent the Virgin Mary.

Purpose, and recognition of missionaries having birthdays on this date were led by Myrna Neff, President. Regular business was conducted by President Myrna, and concluded with a full-scale report by Treasurer Barbara Hart of the finances of the Solid Rock U.M.W. unit for the past year. Mission giving to our church district is largely supported by unit members, who pledge for the year, and when this amount is increased by varied small projects throughout the year, the total giving of the Solid Rock U.M.W. for the year to mission service with women, children, and youth throughout United Methodist projects, schools, etc., was \$1,323.65.

The annual recognition in our group of the service of Prayer and Self-Denial was led by Carolyn Winters. A special offering was taken to support the working and especially the retirement lives of the many women in United Methodist missionary service. The focus of their lives continues to be a service of love and care for women, children, and youth.

He saw the list

Come with me to the hill of Calvary. Watch as the soldiers shove the Carpenter to the ground and stretch his arms against the beams. One presses a knee against a forearm and a spike against a hand. Jesus turns his face toward the nail just as the soldier lifts the hammer to strike it.

Couldn't Jesus have stopped him? With a flex of the biceps, with a clench of the fist, he could have resisted. Is this not the same hand that stilled the sea? Summoned the dead?

But the fist doesn't clench ... and the moment isn't aborted.

The mallet rings and the skin rips and the blood begins to drip, then rush. Then the questions follow. Why? Why didn't Jesus resist?

"Because he loved us," we reply. That is true, wonderfully true, but—forgive me—only partially true. There is more to his reason. He saw something that made him stay. As the soldier pressed his arm, Jesus rolled his head to the side, and with his cheek resting on the wood, he saw:

A mallet? Yes.

A nail? Yes.

The soldier's hand? Yes.

But he saw something else. Between his hand and the wood, there was a list. A long list. A list of our mistakes: our lusts and lies and greedy moments and prodigal years. A list of our sins.

The bad decisions from last year. The bad attitudes from last week. There, in broad daylight for all of heaven to see, was a list of your mistakes.

He saw the list! He knew the price of those sins was death. He knew the source of those sins was you, and since he couldn't bear the thought of eternity without you, he chose the nails.

Easter's meaning

In a 2010 Barna Group survey, two-thirds of Americans knew that Easter is a religious holiday. But only 42 percent connected its meaning to Jesus' resurrection. And only two percent of adults said they would describe Easter as the most important holiday of their faith.

Not everyone who connects Easter to religion has the facts straight. Two percent of Americans said Easter is about Jesus' birth. Another two percent said it's about Jesus' "rebirth." And one percent said it's a celebration of his second coming. Another three percent described Easter as a celebration of spring or a pagan holiday.

In the same survey, 31 percent of active churchgoers said they'd definitely invite an unchurched friend to worship with them on Easter weekend.

This Easter, share the truth and joy of the holiday with someone who doesn't know Jesus. News of the resurrection is too good to keep to ourselves!

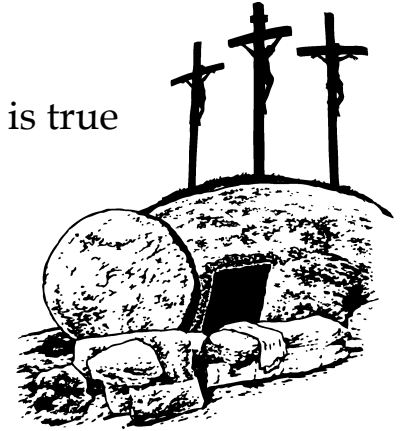


The Least I Can Do
