Congregation to share new building ideas

Solid Rock congregants will have an opportunity to share their ideas for a new church building on Sunday, February 8. Following worship on that morning, we

will gather at the Warren Sportsman's Club for a carry-in lunch, after which those in attendance will meet with representatives from Studio Three, the



architectural firm which has been selected to design the new building. Please plan to attend this event. It is important that everyone share their visions for future ministries and facilities to support them.

Building/Site and Capital Funds Committees discuss next steps

The Building/Site and Capital Funds Committees met jointly on January 13 to discuss the next steps in Solid Rock's building project. Also in attendance were Bill Walter, capital funds campaign consultant from Church Growth Services, and Brian Hollars and Kerry LaPrees, architects from Studio Three.

In his presentation, Bill Walter emphasized the importance of keeping three factors in balance throughout the project: ministry (what the church ultimately wants to accomplish in ministry and the facilities needed to meet these goals), money (the funds needed to complete the project) and materials (the architectural design). The ministry piece will primarily be the responsibility of the Building/Site Committee. Planning for funding of the project will be a cooperative effort involving Church Growth Services and the Capital Funds Committee. The Building/Site Committee, in collaboration with Studio Three, will develop the building plan.

A tentative timeline was outlined. An opportunity for congregational input will be provided following a carry-in lunch on February 8 at the Warren Sportsman's Club. This discussion will be led by representatives from Studio Three. Using ideas gleaned from this session, along with ongoing input from the Building/Site Committee, Studio Three will begin developing preliminary plans. April 15 is the target date for having a basic building plan to present to the congregation for feedback.

As the process continues, Church Growth Services will prepare to answer three questions: (1) What are we going to get for our money? (2) How much will it cost? and (3) How are we going to pay for it? Based on early data provided to the consultant, it is estimated that Solid Rock should be able to generate between \$1.13 million and \$1.53 million in funding for this project. The goal of the Capital Funds Committee is to hold the capital campaign in the fall.

Between now and the congregational input session on February 8, the Building/ Site Committee will be meeting to define needed capacities in four areas: worship, Christian education, fellowship, and administration, after which the architect can proceed with preliminary planning.

Administrative Council

The Solid Rock Administrative Council addressed several finance-related items at its January 20 meeting. Reports from Myrna Neff, church treasurer, show the church to be in good financial condition. The year-end report for 2008 states that contributions and other income totaled \$122, 249.34, while expenditures were \$85,401.70. Cash balance as of December 31 was \$36,847.64.

Following this positive report, Council voted to pay off the remaining balance (approximately \$7,000) of the mortgage on the Jefferson Center parsonage. Council also learned that currently the Building Fund totals about \$15,000. It was agreed to use \$4,000 from this fund to pay a retainer fee to Studio Three, the architect which has been chosen to design the building project. Council also directed that \$10,000 from this fund be invested in a 6-month certificate of deposit with the Indiana United Methodist Loan Fund.

In other business, Council received a report that at least one church copier is experiencing problems, and that none of the current copiers is capable of handling the level of use that has become necessary since the merger. Suggestions were made that current copiers be replaced with one larger-capacity copier with networking capabilities so that all office computers could access it. A decision will be made after further investigation.

Trustees reported that a local Realtor has estimated values of Solid Rock properties, including the two church buildings and two parsonages. There has been no determination yet as to how or when these properties might be offered for sale.

Council members expressed appreciation to S.O.S. for purchasing new blinds and curtains for the church office, which is now located in the Warren parsonage.

Plans were announced regarding the meeting on February 8 with architects from Studio Three. A carry-in lunch at the War-

ren Sportsman's Club will be followed by small-group sessions giving Solid Rock members the opportunity to share ideas for a new church facility. It was emphasized that everyone is urged to participate in this process, including children. Using input from this session, architects will begin initial designs.

The next Council meeting will be March 17 at Jefferson Center.

Next Monday

Three weeks, but who's counting? What is it that makes deciding upon a New Year's resolution so eternally compelling? Why do we always presume the resolution to extinguish bad or inappropriate behaviors is going to last longer than three or four weeks? Finally, the thought occurs to you that you are capable of changing from the undesirable to the desirable action any time you really set your mind to it, and it doesn't necessarily have to be this coming "next Monday." Dietary resolutions especially are susceptible to this kind of convoluted thinking. You can begin in two weeks, or right after your family celebrates Mom and Dad's fortieth wedding anniversary, or as soon as you return from the cruise you are taking to the Bahamas because everyone knows you are going to gain weight on a cruise. Good grief, they have a sundae bar open around the clock at pool side!

My particular recurring vows through the years, naturally, have been to lose weight. If I had lost as many pounds as promising myself, I would be within ten pounds of my birth weight. However, the only thing consistent or habitual is how easily the aforementioned four phases have become a part of my behavioral repertoire. Sometimes. I even add a fifth phase: anger. Not at anyone in particular, unless you can count the women who are walking ahead of me on the street or in a mall and it is obvious that their thighs are not rubbing together. If life were really fair, a person would be able to walk up to them, slap them upside the head and then be able to walk on without any repercussions. But then who said life was fair?
