
The next meeting will be January 10 in the Calico Room at Heritage Pointe. Howard Cress closed with prayer.

To eat or not to eat

As a parent of some fifty years and a meal preparer for even longer, I feel adequately qualified to offer some heartfelt advice to any of you who may be anticipating adding additional seating, of the offspring type, to your holiday tables in years to come. Of course, this only applies if you intend to preserve your family's dietary history.

This caution is prefaced on the understanding that your menu is determined by the issue of your own bloodline, and not by those they may bring to the table. However, in my family, the following "tastes or preferences" are totally disregarded ... though sometimes not openly: my former husband informed me, prior to our marriage, he would eat no food flavored with garlic, a stipulation later shared by a former son-in-law; my sister's husband refused to eat any dish in which onions were a key ingredient, and one brother has the same stipulation with regard to celery. In the instance of certified, life-threatening

However, try cooking Italian, making a bowl of potato salad or Thanksgiving dressing within those constraints. It's amazing what you can get away with when you are catering to rather unsophisticated palates and have a blender at your disposal.

Thus the aforementioned advice, "MOTHERS, DON'T LET YOUR DAUGHTERS GROW UP TO BE VEGANS!" Vegans, as I am sure you know, always inform the uninitiated, they will eat no foods produced by anything "with a face." When you eliminate meat, fish, poultry, dairy and fungus in the form of mushrooms from your possible ingredient list, traditional holiday meals become major issues.

Of course, everyone at the table can be served the expected Thanksgiving turkey while you throw veggie, soy burgers on the grill for the vegans. However, these trouble makers do like dressing and gravy. The dressing in my house has always had the turkey giblets as a major component, and both the dressing and the gravy base include the pan drippings from the roasted turkey. Thus you are compelled to mix two batches of dressing, but one begins with cooking the vegetables in a vegetarian broth and giblets are added to the other. That goes ditto for the gravy; two batches, one starting with vegetarian broth, one with pan drippings. Forget desserts; just toss an apple to each of the vegans.

Any suggestions for Christmas dinners, where pasta e fagioli and ravioli are the mainstays, would be appreciated beyond measure.


