# Methodists among church groups aiding in tornado recovery

In the wake of a tornado that may have left many residents of Rancho Brazos questioning God, mission teams rushed to restore their homes - and their faith. Though they represent varying religious philosophies and denominations, they have shared one common goal: to show God's love by easing suffering.

The United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) is just one of the church-



led groups of volunteers that have been working to clean up the devasited Methodist Committee On Relief tation from the

May 15 tornado that killed six in Hood County.

"We respond to disasters around the world. We stay, really, until the needs are gone," said Vince Gonzales, who is serving as the temporary coordinator for the Hood County relief effort.

The Methodist organization has a presence in more than 80 countries. Its humanitarian efforts are not just for those impacted by natural disasters, but also for those suffering in conflict and war-torn areas.

When donors give to a specific project, 100 percent of the money goes to that project. Administrative costs are covered through a once-a-year special offering taken by Methodist churches around the globe, said Gonzales, a trial consultant whose wife, Shelly, is associate pastor of First United Methodist Church in

Weatherford.

UMCOR's response to Granbury's tragedy was swift. The day after the tornado struck, the organization announced that it was sending emergency funds to the Central Texas Annual Conference to assist with immediate relief needs. The Granbury tornado had been among 18 that day in the North Texas region.

A posting to the Central Texas Conference's website a few days after tragedy struck in Granbury stated that 26 Early Response Team members were on the ground – or on roofs needing repair – in Rancho Brazos.

The Methodist organization has continued to focus funding, prayers and volunteer efforts on Hood County in the weeks since. Last week, at a meeting of the long-term recovery committee, Gonzales spoke about issues that he feared might "re-traumatize" Rancho Brazos residents, if proper care was not taken by well-meaning volunteers. "These people have been in shock, and some of them still are in shock," Gonzales told the Hood County News on Monday. He said that any time victims of such a tragedy return to their property to find possessions in trash cans or repair work done improperly, "it rips open a scab and just delays their healing."

Gonzales promised that UMCOR will stay until Rancho Brazos has been restored. "We're going to get this (neighborhood) back to what it was – and maybe better," he said.

### **Dwell in unity**

Considering the staggering height of redwood trees, we assume they must need incredibly deep roots. But these giants have extremely shallow roots, growing only 4 to 6 feet deep.

Instead of heading downward. the roots extend outward spreading out as far as 125 feet. Stability occurs because the roots intertwine with those of neighboring trees. This network allows redwoods to stand tall despite strong winds and storms.

In a similar way, such interconnectedness keeps the body of Christ standing strong. Psalm 133:1 urges believers to "dwell in unity" (ESV). In order to inhabit one another's lives, we must share our stories, offer forgiveness and provide encouragement. Through those actions, our roots spread wide as we support our brothers and sisters in Christ.

While teaching a Bible college class, Donald Miller conducted an interesting experiment. He told students he was going to leave out one important truth and that they should try to detect it. Miller then talked about people's sinfulness and our need to

repent; he read Scripture and stories; he discussed the reward awaiting us in heaven.

Not one of the 45 students realized their professor had left out Jesus. "I had said nothing

about his love, his life and incarnation, his death or his resurrection," Miller says. "I had said nothing about our need to ... have his righteousness cover us."

Miller, author of *Blue Like Jazz*, says he could probably conduct the same experiment from Christian church pulpits, and few people would notice or be upset. Faith should be a relationship, not a formula, he argues, and it's hard to have a relationship when you leave out Jesus.

a sympathetic ear. Show us when to open our mouths and when to hold our peace that we may glorify you both in speech and in silence through Jesus Christ our Lord.
