# **Rediscovering Our Wesleyan Heritage**

Solid Rock's affiliation with the Global Methodist

Church begins this month. The GMC seeks to honor and be faithful to the heritage of the Methodist movement, initiated primarily by John and Charles Wesley. The Firm Foundation Sunday school class, which meets each Sunday morning at 9:00 in the church



kitchen, invites you to join them in discovering or rediscovering our Wesleyan heritage.

We will be exploring answers to such questions as:

- Who were John and Charles Wesley and how did the Methodist movement get started?
- What was their original intent, and what were some outcomes of their ministries?
- How did their influence extend from England to America?
- Why was the Methodist movement so successful on the American frontier?
- Who were the circuit riders? Were they in Indiana? Warren? (Spoiler: yes!)
- How was a Methodist presence in Warren established?
- How did the Warren Methodist Episcopal Church and the Jefferson Center Methodist Episcopal Church (predecessors of Solid Rock) get started?
- What doctrines and practices were emphasized by the Wesleys, and how do we experience their legacy today?

# **Disaffiliation Complete**

Solid Rock was one of 174 churches officially approved for disaffiliation at the Indiana UMC Annual Conference on June 8. Upon receipt of the final statement, Solid Rock will submit the required disaffiliation fee, completing the process. Disaffiliation will be effective

July 1, and affiliation with the Global Methodist Church will take effect on July 1.

A total of 318 Indiana churches have disaffiliated from the UMC, about 30% of Indiana United Methodist churches. No further Indiana disaffiliations are anticipated as this was the final opportunity for Indiana Conference churches. Disaffiliations are still expected in other parts of the U.S. as other annual conferences are convened before the disaffiliation provision expires at the end of 2023.

The Great Lakes Conference of the GMC (Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, and Wisconsin) will welcome 219 new clergypersons and 156 new churches into membership on July 1. The first meeting of the Great Lakes Annual Conference is expected to take place this fall.

solitude. What I didn't realize at the time was that I was holding on to the very thing that would destroy me. I wouldn't let go of past hurts and trauma and it almost destroyed my self-worth, abilities, and relationships with God and others. I developed physical problems, became fearful of getting close to others emotionally, and didn't trust the current relationships I had, and I held on to the bitterness that made me feel like the victim I allowed it to become. This wasn't what God wanted for me and my life.

God then stepped in and brought people into my life that would change my life. God first had to make me release the death grip I had on the things that imprisoned my mind and soul. I had to become vulnerable once again. Why? I had to learn to feel again. I had emotionally and relationally severed my heart's sensitivity to feeling love, compassion, acceptance, and the ability to feel hurt, which isn't always a bad thing. I had gotten to the point where I refused to feel emotionally. I was dead inside. God Himself, along with those He brought into my life, gave me the spiritual and emotional CPR to get my heart to begin to live again. My perception was I thought of never rising from my dead state. Yet, God breathed into my soul life and purpose. He took from my hands the things I refused to release and held me and breathed life into me. I gasped and opened my eyes to the new reality that I was worthy of love, and He gave me His love. I was alive again and it felt beautiful to breathe and live.

What are you holding on to? Is it helping you or causing you to slowly die within? Are you holding on to grudges, pride, judgment, and unforgiveness? Are you tired of holding on and wanting to let go? God can and will help you! After all, how can God hold your hand when your hands are full?

There are times when I would love to simply be held, and it's not just during bad times. I want to just feel the warmth of the embrace of someone who loves me. Hearing their heartbeat and feeling secure in the arms of someone who really cares for and about me. I get this with God. I have found places like this in others that He has brought into my life at the times I needed it most. I had to simply answer Jesus' question: "Do you want to be healed?" Then let go and be held by a loving God.

# Welcomed back to the fold

When her beloved dogs "returned home from an adventure smelling of eau de skunk parfum," Pastor Joanna Loucky-Ramsey refused to let them in the house. Instead, she cleaned and cared for them outside, slowly reintroducing them to "full participation in family life" once the stink eased.

Loucky-Ramsey continues: "Just as our dogs needed our help to get rid of the smell of skunk, we need



God's help to purge us from the offense of sin that permeates our nature and masks who God created us to be. That's what Jesus accomplished by his death and resurrection: to make us new and whole."



# Keep trying

In *The God Who Stays*, contemporary Christian musician Matthew West writes about the pandemic's fear-filled early days. After his concert tour was abruptly canceled in

March 2020, he rode to an airport "feeling utterly hopeless about a world that was spinning out of control."

Then Arthur, his ride-share driver, began singing along to the radio — and the song happened to be West's "The God Who Stays." West joined in, jokingly asking how he sounded. "Not so



good," Arthur replied, not knowing West's identity. "You keep trying."

The driver shared how those lyrics uplifted him during life's difficulties, and West later recalled that conversation during lockdown, while wondering where God was. The musician realized he had "settled for a socially distant relationship with the One who is nearer than I dare to believe, closer than the air I breathe." But West pictured "God running toward me with open arms like the prodigal's father," and he resolved to keep trying — and to grow closer to the God who always stays.

# Shepherding Moments

## Holding On or Being Held

I was having devotions with my daughter and the discussion of our past came up and how people view their past. In the discussion, we discovered how people tend to desire one of two things: holding on or being held. You might ask what the difference between each of them is truly worlds apart from one another.

Holding on is an action that many of us do consciously or subconsciously. We choose to hold on deliberately in a positive manner through cherished memories, traditions, family traits, and patterns of doing things. Negatively, we choose to hold on to grudges, poor attitudes, wrongful judgments, brokenness and traumas, stubbornness, biases, unforgiveness, and bitterness. Depending on the person and their resilience (or lack of resilience), this can hold a person's ability to heal and be restored hostage for a long time.

Being held has a very different effect on the individual

because it is something we all desire. Holding on requires us to exert the power and energy to grasp. What we grab hold of with us holding on to often takes a great deal from us because there's always a possibility of resistance from those that we attempt to hold. In most cases, all involved want to be held; however, there are those whose past

taught them to become standoffish to prevent further trauma and rejection.

Having been on both sides of the coin, I can testify to the impact of both and say the fears and feelings are justified for both selfpreservation and growth.



Once fearing love because of the constant heartbreak and pain of losing a loved one in a variety of ways (death, moving away from, abandonment of relationships, etc.), I fought to not be vulnerable anymore because of having hopes and trust broken, promises that were made never kept. With each relationship failing, I sank deeper into depression and anger. My soul was beyond empty and even angered at people trying to invade my fortress of


