- The Staff/Pastor-Parish Relations


Committee has completed their annual clergy assessment.


- The concession stand is once again able to offer a full menu. Business has been brisk.

Mitch's mate, Marge, was a suitable helper to him in all aspects of his ministry. The couple consistently visited many of the rodents in the large community surrounding the church.

"God has entrusted all the mice in this area to our care," Mitch explained to Marge. "Just as God called Pastor Marvin to serve as the minis-



ter to the humans in our church, He has called us to serve the mice."

Mitch and Marge knew their church's members had spiritual needs, but they also realized the congregation had an abundance of other circumstances that needed to be changed. The couple led the congregation in starting a ministry designed to meet those needs: A food pantry, paying utilities, and help in paying the local rodent physicians and purchasing medicine for needy rodent families, etc.

Madge was among those mice receiving free cheese from the ministry. A disabled widow, Madge was unable to work.

plied the resources required to meet all of the family's needs.

Millie, another younger mouse, had been laid off from her job as quality control inspector at the local cheese processing plant. While Millie faithfully searched for a new job, the ministry helped buy her groceries.

"I'm glad you sensed the Lord leading us to start this ministry," March told Mitch. "It's having a huge impact on the entire community."

Indeed, as word about the ministry spread, more and more mice began seeking assistance from the ministry, as well as attending the worship services.

Moses was among that group of mice. The ministry provided much needed assistance in Moses and his family replenishing their bare cupboard with cheese. The family joined the church and excitedly began participating in the ministry's outreach.

The ministry began growing so rapidly that the available mouse power was not enough to minister to the entire metropolitan area of mice.

After being mentored by Mitch for a few months, Moses said he believed the Lord was calling him to begin a new branch of the ministry to the under-served part of the community.

Although it was hard for Moses to explain to his mentor God's call on his life, Moses explained the holy encounter this way: "It was sort of like when God spoke to the Moses of the Bible out of the burning bush that wasn't being consumed."

"You mean God spoke to you out of a burning bush?"

"No, it was more like I was standing too close to a nearby firecracker that exploded, but I still got the message loud and clear!"

From guilt to grace

For Jerry Schemmel, a 1989 plane crash that killed more than 100 people ended up shaping his life and faith. The sports broadcaster walked away from the tragedy with

minimal physical injuries but was haunted by survivor's guilt and PTSD. "The big turning point for me came when I became a Christian," he

says. "Things got much easier to deal with after that, I believe, because I had the best ally fighting the fight with me, Jesus Christ."

Schemmel, author of *Chosen to Live*, says he'd love to be able to "go back and rewrite the script" and change what happened that July day in Sioux City, Iowa. "But since I can't, I just have to keep on trusting God, trusting that he put me through this experience to serve him, to be the man he wants me to be and ultimately give him glory."

Our way out

While in London, Timothy Merrill was intrigued that signs with arrows read WAY OUT, rather than EXIT, as they do in America. "Everywhere I went, I saw signs that



showed me the WAY OUT," he writes. That made him ponder all the Bible characters who looked for a WAY OUT of predicaments. Moses

looked for a WAY OUT of Egypt, Daniel certainly wanted a WAY OUT of the lions' den and countless people thought (and still think) there's no WAY OUT from their sins.

"The good news of the Gospel," Merrill writes, "is that Jesus Christ is the WAY OUT! He is our exit from the messes and disasters we create. He is the exit from sin and unrighteousness. He is the WAY OUT of a life without purpose and the WAY OUT of a life without purpose and the WAY IN to an abundant life. And the symbol of the WAY OUT is not an arrow but a cross. What a blessing to know that Jesus knows — and is — the WAY OUT!"

A kindled fire

"I can worship outside among nature just as well as I can inside a church building." That claim is especially common during the summer, when church attendance tends to decline.

Certainly it's possible to worship and talk to God among his creation. In fact, George Washington Carver called nature "an unlimited broadcasting station, through which God speaks to us every hour, if we will only tune in." And Martin Luther said, "God writes the Gospel not in the Bible alone, but also on trees, and in the flowers and clouds and stars."

Yet corporate, or church, worship is still vital. Luther also noted: "At home, in my own house, there is no warmth or vigor in me, but in the church when the multitude is gathered together, a fire is kindled in my heart and it breaks its way through." When we're away from God's house, we miss blessings and opportunities including communion, fellowship and support. So this summer, spend time in nature but don't neglect "to meet together" (see Hebrews 10:25)!

Concession Stand


