Administrative Council

The Solid Rock Administrative Council met on May 19 at the Warren site. Treasurer Myrna Neff reported March income of \$20,193.62 and expenditures of \$12,384.51. Income for April was \$18,822.14, with expenditures of \$18,509.06. Cash balance as of April 30 was \$25,324.64.

Trustees reported that sales of both the Jefferson Center church and the Jefferson Center parsonage are pending. June 5 has been set as the closing date on the church property. It is being purchased by New Hope Church in Huntington and will continue to be used as a church.

The trustees are in the process of doing necessary renovations to the Warren parsonage. Pastor Kathy Newton will move to the Warren parsonage, with the front of the home continuing to serve as the church office. The move is scheduled to take place the week of June 1.

Jeff Walter reported on plans for Celebration of Ministry Sunday on May 31 at Jefferson Center. This will be the final service to be held at the Jefferson Center site. Beginning on June 7, all services will take place at the Warren site.

The Capital Funds Team reported that phone surveys have been conducted by Church Growth Services. Based on input received through these interviews and feedback provided on Vision Sunday, a congregational survey has been prepared. This confidential survey will take place on June 7. Church Growth Services will then prepare a recommendation regarding the timing of a capital funds campaign.

The Building/Site Committee is scheduled to meet May 26. They will be reviewing comments generated on Vision Sunday.

The S.O.S. group reported that approximately 100 women participated in the "Day Away" on May 16.

The next meeting of Administrative Council is set for June 23. All meetings will now take place at the Warren site.

May 31 service marks final chapter in 82-year Jefferson Center history

The merger of the Jefferson Center and Warren United Methodist churches to form Solid Rock brings together two long and rich histories of ministry to the Warren community. The Jefferson Center facility has now been sold, and the service on May 31 will be the last worship celebrated there by the congregation.

The founding of Jefferson Center in 1927 was itself the result of a merger. There were two Methodist Episcopal churches in Jefferson Township in the early 1920s, one at Pleasant Plain, two miles west of Jefferson Center, and one at Otterbein, two miles south of Jefferson Center. Both churches were struggling with declining enrollments and finances. In the

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early months of 1926, plans for merging the congregations began to take shape.

The site of the old Center School seemed an appropriate location for the new church building. Initial thoughts were to move the Otterbein church and demolish the Pleasant Plain church, but plans for a new building using lumber salvaged from the old buildings prevailed. Benjamin Beaver of Majenica was awarded the contract to erect the building. The new building was completed by the end of the year.

What is today considered a modest structure was, at the time of its building, a state-of-the-art rural church. The Warren Tribune stated that "when the building is finished and the old school house torn away the Jefferson Center congregation is going to have one of the most attractive homes to be found in Huntington County." The Van Buren newspaper noted that "the new church is to be modern in every respect, being electric lighted and have class rooms, kitchen, dining room, etc." The building was dedicated on January 9, 1927.

School's out

The end of another school year. It has always been a guilty secret that teachers look forward to summer vacation every bit as much as students do. Even though by the end of summer, I am anxiously anticipating getting back into the structure and routine of the school year. June is a time for looking toward weeks of no routine, no back-toback thirty minute therapy periods, no meetings, no paperwork and most of all, no federally mandated regulations, the only objective of which appear to be to interfere with the process of education rather than to foster it. But that is the fodder for another soapbox rant at another time.

My joy in school is to be able to spend time in a world as seen through the eyes of children. Every day brings new insights into the very literal and concrete ways they interpret everything happening in the school environment. Much of the fascination is that I continue to be surprised even after so many, many years, sometimes not even in a good way. One year, working in a school exclusively for severely, multiply impaired elementary children. I was talking with a 10 year old who was confined to a wheelchair. He had played a particularly mean trick on a classmate who had been blind since birth. I asked how he could justify doing that to someone who was actually his friend. He assured me it was not really a bad thing to do, "since David can walk."

This year has been particularly difficult for students. While there have been some fun moments, there have been times when the thoughts shared and the expressions of fear and apprehension have been heartwrenching. I cannot think of a time when

the state of the nation and anxiety over the future have been so prevalent in the everyday life of so many children.

They share information about one or both parents losing jobs, fear about losing or having already lost their houses, imminent divorces, having to move in with grandparents or other relatives, having to move to new schools wherever possible jobs might be available and the inability to do things that their parents used to be able to afford. One first grade teacher told me of three children in her class who had essentially been "abandoned" by their parents, leaving them with other caregivers, while seeking jobs elsewhere.

A bomb threat in the high school, which ultimately proved to be a hoax, resulted in the schools being in lockdown for two days. Rumors multiplied, scaring parents and students alike, and while the precautions taken were necessary, many children were terrified and had difficulty returning to school. Additionally, the threat of flu, with daily reminders about coughing into their elbows, hand-washing and use of sanitizer repeatedly in every classroom compounded the stress.

A fitting way to close this school year would be to echo the prayer of Tim Cratchit, in Charles Dickens' A CHRIST-MAS CAROL. "God, Bless Us Everyone."
