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News deadline for the April newsletter: March 22 was getting to attend the "Roaring 20's Pizza and Pipes" performance in Ellenton. The organist was Dwight Thomas, a native of Marysville, Ohio.

The Wurlitzer organ was originally installed in 1931 in the Paramount Theatre in Oakland, California. After passing through several owners, it was purchased for use at the Roaring 20's Pizza and Pipes in Ellenton, Florida.

The organ is powered by a 20horsepower Spencer Blower which supplies air for the 2,456 organ pipes and percussions. Most of the percussions (chimes, xylophone, glockenspiel, chrysoglott, marimba, tuned sleigh bells, piano, drums, traps and effects) are located outside of the organ chambers. The volume of the organ is controlled by the "shutters" above the glass pipe window, which allow the sound to project into the restaurant.

There were pipes and drums and horns, etc. all around the room, and as each played they lit up. What an extraordinary program! The pizza wasn't bad either!

Myrna ate at quite a few of the seafood restaurants and enjoyed all of them. She also had fun "shopping."



Having followed all of the letters to the editor in local newspapers re: the challenge to the released time religious education trailer in Huntington, one thing I have never seen in any of the letters is the complete definition of the First Amendment, which includes the second half of the religious clause.

It says, in full: "Congress shall make no law respecting the establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances."

Each citizen has the right to "petition the Government for a redress of grievances" as is being done in Huntington. The judicial system has now been activated by the grievance of a single nameless, faceless individual. The community's religious, legal, and educational resources have been marshaled. The whole community awaits adjudication. The only glimmer of an answer is the judge's suggestion that the religious education program be halted, even when the Government is not to prohibit the free exercise of a citizenry's religious exercises.

I will be glad to hear a verdict for or against in order that we can make better use of the First Amendment in its entirety rather than just ten words out of forty-five. So far, the citizenry as a unit has been able to meet in a peaceable assembly, to speak freely, to petition the government for a redress of a grievance made against a legislated, lawful religious exercise.


Wednesday.


