

In all this I wondered where God fit into their worlds?

So my question for you this month is, Where does God fit into your life? Are you lifting your hands in praise for God's abundance? Do you recognize that your carts are overflowing with abundance? Or are you too busy comparing to see God's abundance in your life? I pray that as your families gather that you will pause long enough to praise the giver of your abundance.



E-Reader Project set to expand in Africa, Philippines


At Gbarnga School of Theology, there's no running water, electricity comes and goes, and classrooms remain scarred from when troops occupied them during Liberia's long civil war.

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porarily because of the Ebola epidemic gripping Liberia and much of West Africa. Still, learning goes on. That's because each student has an e-reader provided by The United Methodist Church and loaded with books well-suited for a pastor's education. "These 85 students have their e-readers with them, wherever they are, and continue to use them to read and study and to preach

and teach in churches," said Robin Pippin of The United Methodist Church's Discipleship Ministries (formerly known as the Board of Discipleship.)

The denomination's E-Reader Project, which Pippin helps run, debuted in 2013 at Gbarnga and is set to expand to 15 more United Methodist schools in Africa, as well as four in the Philippines.

Some 1,500 Kindles will be distributed

by 2016, catapulting students and faculty members over the digital divide.

Of the E-Reader Project, the Rev. Yatta Young, former Gbarnga dean, said: "Its potential for improving theological education in Africa is enormous.'

Persevering faith

In the movie Monumental. Kirk Cameron describes what led the Pilgrims to leave England and Holland for America — as well

as the conditions they faced along the way. While on the cramped, storm-tossed Mayflower, they signed the Mayflower Compact, attesting that they came "for the glory of God and advancements of the Christian faith."

Within months in the new land, 47 of the original 121 Pilgrims had died. Only six or seven could walk and care for the others, and only four adult women were still alive for the first Thanksgiving. But the Pilgrims persevered, thanks to their faith in God and help from Native Ameri-

cans

William Bradford, governor of Plymouth Colony for 30 years, experienced hardship firsthand: his wife was one of the first to die during the journey. Yet Bradford's tomb bears the bold message that "Jehovah is

our help."

If ever I reach heaven I expect to find three wonders there: first, to meet some I had not thought to see there; second, to miss some I had expected to see there; and third — the greatest wonder of all — to find myself there.


