Although the following story from the Vietnam War era is frequently found among "urban legends," it, unlike most others, is essentially true.

November 14, 1965, Landing Zone X-Ray, Vietnam, 11 days until Thanksgiving. But Thanksgiving would come early that year for one 19-year-old kid, critically wounded and dying in the jungle of the Ia Drang Valley.

His infantry unit was outnumbered 8-1 and the enemy fire was so intense from 100 or 200 yards away, his own commander had ordered the landing zone closed. So there he lay, listening to the enemy machine guns, knowing he wasn't going to make it. His family was half way around the world, 12,000 miles away, and he would never see them again. As the world started to fade in and out, he knew this was "the day." Then, over the machine gun noise, he faintly heard the sound of a helicopter and looked up to see an unarmed Huey.

Ed Freeman was coming to get him. Ed wasn't a medevac pilot, so it wasn't his job. But the medevacs had refused to fly, so there he was, flying down into the machine gun fire, dropping his craft to the ground and sitting there in a hail of bullets while someone loaded up the young man and a couple of others. Then he flew up and out through the gunfire to the doctors and nurses who would save the young men's lives.

And, he kept coming back!! 13 more times!! ... until he had rescued about 30 men who would never have seen another (Continued on page 3)

Quiz Answers

1. What is the person called who assists in a worship service, including the lighting of candles?

The correct answer is acolyte. Typically, the role of acolyte is filled by a young person, but adults are allowed to serve as acolytes, too. The local pastor can decide who serves and what duties are appropriate.

2. A way to partake of the elements in the Lord's Supper is:

The correct answer is intinction, the act of dipping the bread into a chalice filled with wine, then eating the moistened bread.

3. If you are outside the church and want to enter the sanctuary, what do you usually go through?

The correct answer is the narthex, the part of the church building that connects to the entrance door of the sanctuary.

4. What is a station?

The answer is a pastor's only church. A station is a pastoral assignment that is made of only one local church. This is in contrast to a circuit, which contains two or more churches.

5. When local churches send part of their offerings to their district and conference, it is called...

The correct answer is apportionment, a long -standing tradition in The United Methodist Church.

6. Before we have a relationship with God, he offers us what kind of grace? The correct answer is prevenient grace, a presence that does not depend upon our actions or response.

7. What's the name of the four-year period after each General Conference? The correct answer is quadrennium. The quadrennium is the four-year period after each General Conference during which the church carries out the policy and plans approved during that General Conference.

8. If you want to serve as a local pastor, deacon, or elder, you would apply for what?

The correct answer is candidacy, a discerning and preparatory period of time for the candidate. Those who want to serve as local pastors, deacons or elders use this time to explore their calling. During this time, the candidates also guided and evaluated by their annual conference.

9. What do we call the bread and wine used in the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper?

The correct answer is elements, the bread

and wine used in the Lord's Supper.

10. If you want to know what United Methodists believe, you would start with what section of The Book of Discipline? In 1808, the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church passed the first Restrictive Rule, ensuring that the Articles of Religion may not be changed. To this day, the articles are printed unchanged in each edition of The Book of Discipline.

Exercising our gratitude muscles

Expressing gratitude isn't just a good thing to do; it also appears to be good *for* us! Indiana University researchers found that participants who performed gratitudefocused writing exercises felt uplifted, and were more likely to express gratefulness through generosity, even weeks later.

Furthermore, brain scans revealed increased gratitude-related activity even months down the road (*New York Magazine*).

Though the study was small, we seem to have a "gratitude muscle" that can be strengthened through exercise. If so, there may be more than we thought to the popularity of gratitude journals and Mom's insistence that we write thank-you notes. Not to mention the biblical call to "give thanks to the LORD, for he is good" (1 Chronicles 16:34, for example).

Might God have hardwired us for gratitude — not only at Thanksgiving but year round — because it's good for us as well as for those we thank? To that, we respond, "Thanks be to God!"
