Henderson Settlement Work Camp

Henderson Settlement was founded in 1925 by Reverend Hiram Frakes, a Methodist Minister. At this time there were elementary schools in the area, but the nearest high school was 30 miles away. With no land and no money Rev. Frakes shared his dream to provide a school for all children with whoever would listen. Scott Partin gave 16 acres, Bill Henderson gave all 68 acres of his land, and others gave small parcels of their land.

Rev. Frakes went to his bishop, Theodore Henderson, for financial help, and in

1927 the school was constructed. Shortly afterward dormitories were added for orphans



and students who lived too far to walk to school. Dormitory students would do laundry, milk cows, and garden before and after school and through the summer to help pay for their school as well as to keep the Settlement going.

A church was established along with the school. In the 1930s a farm, a gristmill, and a sawmill became a part of the Settlement under the leadership of Rev. Frakes.

Some of the ministries today of Henderson Settlement are Community Services, Youth Ministry, Senior Center, New Mother Support, Thrift Stores, Craft Shop and Work Camps/Volunteers in Mission. The progress of Henderson Settlement was made possible by the support of the Methodist Board of Missions and churches around the country through salary support for staff and scholarships for children.

Henderson Settlement is located in Frakes, Kentucky, with a goal to meet the basic needs of the Appalachian people. In the past we have supported Henderson Settlement by giving "Covenant Money" to Gary and Vicki Stevenson. In June, 2013

Sweet Gratitude from Armenia

September 11, 2014—In Armenia, near the border with Turkey, is the dusty village of Aniavan. The land surrounding the village is very dry, and there is no irrigation system to support or even encourage crop growth.

In July and August, all the vegetation turns brown, and there is not even a trace of green. Only small garden plots adjacent to homes manage to survive, due to the hard work of diligent housewives, who try to improve family meals with a few herbs, cabbage, beans and cucumbers.

Because of these conditions the villagers are vulnerable to greater levels of food insecurity. That's why the Armenia country office of the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR)chose the village for its "Fighting Hunger through Sustainable Livelihoods Development" program this year, which UMCOR is implementing with funding support from Foods Resource Bank (FRB).

Ani and Armen Saghatelyan are typical of the village families participating in the program. Their small income is not enough to support them and their two school-age children. They often have had to borrow money to meet basic needs such as doctor visits and to buy wheat flour and cereals before the onset of the long winter months when these foods are scarce.

"It was in the beginning of January when we first learned about UMCOR, the Foods Resource Bank and the opportunity of improving food security in our community. Everyone was happy to learn about how

(Continued from "Armenia," page 2) the funds for the project were gathered," the Saghatelyans reported.


FRB's approach is based on "growing projects," through which U.S.-based individuals, congregations and communities raise funds to support food security programs around the world. These may involve agriculture, animal husbandry or other activities.

Growing projects often involve U.S. farmers who produce and sell a crop and then donate the proceeds to FRB for the food security programs, creating a farmer-to-farmer connection. The programs are implemented by any one of FRB's 15 member organizations and their partners, including UMCOR.

Thanks to FRB's partnership with UM-COR, 28 families in Aniavan received the support they needed—in training and materials—to establish bee, poultry or dairy farms. Eight of the families, including the Saghatelyans, received beehives, eight received chickens, and eight received sheep. Another four families will receive the offspring of the sheep.

With help from a beekeeping consultant, who regularly visited the village, Ani and Armen established successful bee colonies. They were attentive to every word of the consultant, who trained them in new skills and provided them with medicines to keep the beehives healthy and guarantee a successful harvest.

And the Saghatelyans were indeed successful. They harvested 40 pounds of

honey this year. Through the program, they also received a centrifuge, which they are using to help the other beekeeping families harvest their honey.

"With the help of U.S.-based farmers and community groups, my family now has a small beehive farm. My wife and I have learned new skills in beekeeping, management of a farm and all the activities that are important to keeping healthy and productive

bee colonies," said Armen.

"My neighbors, who also are supported by this program, have received training and supplies that enable them to produce eggs, yogurt and cheese. They produce enough of these items for their families and to barter for other food items such as vegetables and fruits," he added.
