Since joining the staff here at Solid Rock, I felt the different children and



youth areas need their own identity. With that being said, our nursery will be called "Pebbles," preschool age will be

"Little Rocks," elementary will be "Rock Foundations," and the youth (5th-12th) "Rock Solid Youth."

We will not be releasing children in the nursery or children's church until a parent or guardian comes

to pick up their child. The nursery will be offered prior to the start of service. Whoever



is in the nursery for service needs to arrive 5-10 minutes prior to the start of service to relieve the person in the nursery from the Sunday School hour. We will be getting a dry erase board posted in the nursery, and whoever is in the nursery will write down the child's name, parent/guardian name,



and phone number. It will be up to the parent's discretion when they bring their child into the nurs-

ery, whether it is at the beginning of service or after the children's sermon.

We will be doing one Sunday school class for preschool- 4th grade and one Sunday school class for 5th-12th grades.

We have been averaging 14 kids and having a lot of fun learning about Esther at Kids Club. We had 9 kids come out for the

Back-2-School Bash, in which we played several "Minute-to-Win-It" games instead of the kickball game due to the weather, but still had a water balloon fight.

Lincoln was shot). Our leader is a man with a Master's degree in American History. Every week, he reads a selection from Lincoln's writings, and then he gives a talk explaining what it means, and suggesting ways we can apply it to our lives. And of course, February 12th, Lincoln's birthday, is a big holiday for us. We have parties, and exchange gifts, and sing Civil War songs. Sometimes, one of us dresses up like Lincoln in a beard and top hat, and he gives out presents to the kids. It's a lot of fun."

"That's fascinating! So you must study Lincoln's life and writings?"

"Well, not exactly. I do own a leather bound copy of Lincoln's complete works — his speeches, his writings, his letters. It's beautiful. I have it displayed on a table by our front door, so when anyone comes in the house, they can see that I'm a follower of Abraham Lincoln. I also own several biographies of Lincoln. One of these days I really do plan to read them. I just haven't had the time yet."

"But how can you be a disciple of Lincoln if you don't read what he wrote?"

"Well, it's mostly common-sense stuff, really. 'Do unto others,' the golden rule, be nice to people, free the slaves, that kind of thing. And besides, I listen to a half-hour speech on Lincoln every Friday."

"I see. So how does being a follower of Lincoln affect your life?"

"Well, like I said, I go to a meeting every Friday. I celebrate Lincoln's birthday once a year. I own a leather-bound edition of his writings and speeches. Oh, and most of my friends are also Linconians."

"So when you get together with your friends, you talk about Lincoln's life and how to live out his teachings?"

"Oh, no. That stuff's for Fridays, when we go to the meetings. No, we just talk about sports, politics, our families. The same things everybody else talks about."

A Way Forward

The Commission on a Way Forward was proposed by the Council of Bishops and approved by the 2016 General Conference to do a complete examination and possible revision of every paragraph of the Book of Discipline concerning human sexuality and explore options that help to maintain and strengthen the unity of the church. The 32-member Commission concluded its ninth and final meeting in Nashville on May 16.

The Commission reviewed a wide variety of petitions presented as legislation to previous General Conferences regarding human sexuality and examined how other faith communities and denominations are responding or have responded to the question of inclusion of LGBTQ persons.

The report of the Commission on a Way Forward will be received and acted upon by a special session of General Conference to be held in St. Louis, Missouri, February 23-26, 2019. This worldwide gathering of United Methodists will only act on items around our deep divide over homosexuality.

The Council of Bishops considered three plans developed by the Commission on a Way Forward. The Council of Bishops has indicated its majority recommendation for the One Church Plan, which could allow for different approaches in different places. Their report to the special called 2019 General Conference will also include information about the other two plans.

One Church Plan (recommended)

The one-church model would allow different United Methodists in different places to make different decisions regarding ministry with or by LGBTQ persons rather than maintaining a single standard that operates everywhere throughout the worldwide church. This plan would remove restrictive language from the Book of Discipline and give conferences, churches and pastors the flexibility to "uniquely reach their missional context in relation to human sexuality without changing the connectional nature of The United Methodist Church."

United Methodists in central conferences in Africa, Asia and Europe would retain the authority to adapt the Book of Discipline and could continue to include their traditional language and values. This plan would also protect the rights of United Methodists whose theological convictions will not allow them to perform same-sex weddings or ordain LGBTQ people.

Traditionalist Plan

This plan would affirm the current language about homosexuality in the Book of Discipline and seek to strengthen enforcement for violations of church law.

Connectional-Conference Plan

This plan would create three connectional conferences based on theology or perspective, each having clearly defined values (accountability, contextualization and justice). The three connectional conferences would function throughout the worldwide church and the five existing U.S. jurisdictions would be abolished.

Adaptations to the Book of Discipline would be allowed by each connectional conference. Annual conferences would determine their affiliation with a connectional conference. Local churches who choose a branch other than the one chosen by their annual conference could vote to join another conference. This plan would require multiple amendments to the denomination's constitution.

Sunday school's origins

Sunday school began in England as early as 1751. Better known is Robert

Raikes' work in Gloucester 30 years later. Concerned about poor children who worked in factories six days a week and often turned to crime, he offered classes on the only day kids were free. Soon various organizations



offered a loose network of such Sunday schools, which taught basic reading and writing, using the Bible as a text.

Ten years later, Samuel Slater started the first U.S. Sunday school in his Rhode Island textile mills. By the mid-1800s, Sunday school attendance was an almostuniversal childhood experience. As society became more secular and public education was mandated by the 1870s, Sunday schools focused on spiritual practices: prayers, hymns, catechism knowledge and Scripture memorization.

Well into the 20th century, Sunday school served as the church's main outreach tool. Many adults fondly remember their teachers and lessons, and Sunday school continues to play a significant part in faith development.

Solid Rock Small Group Opportunities

SUNDAY SMALL GROUPS (Sunday School)

Children's Classes

PEBBLES (Nursery) This is where children 0-4 are welcome to come and enjoy a time of playing while parents attend their Sunday School class.

LITTLE ROCKS/ROCK

FOUNDATIONS (Preschool-Grade 4) This is where children from preschool through 4th grade come together to learn about a "Bible account" story and have some kind activity or craft. The "Bible account" stories will start off with a series called Held Captive. The topic will continue into Children's Church with how it relates to us in real life.

ROCK SOLID YOUTH (Grades 5-12)

This is for 5th through 12th graders to come learn more about the Bible and Bible stories. We will first be looking into the book of Genesis, reading and discussing a couple chapters at a time.

Adult Classes FAITHFUL FAMILIES

The goal of this group is to provide enough time, study, multi-tasking, and the overall support to live out God's hope and love for our marriages, for raising children, and for giving to God's work in our community. (This group pairs with a seasonal small group of the same name.) Meeting site alternates between junior church room and fellowship area.

FIRM FOUNDATION

"For no one can lay any foundation other than the one already laid, which is Jesus Christ." 1 Corinthians 3:11 Beginning October 7, this class will be exploring "Making Sense of the Bible: Rediscovering the Power of Scripture Today." Using a video presentation, well-known and well-respected minister Adam Hamilton opens up the Bible's humanity and its wisdom for living. In six weeks, we will discuss: making sense of the Old Testament; making sense of the New Testament; questions about the nature of Scripture; the Bible and science; violence, suffering and other troubling issues; and wrestling with issues of sexuality and relationships. Meeting site: church kitchen.

FRIENDS IN FAITH

This group meets in either the fellowship area or the nearby junior church room.

REAL LIFE

This group meets in the lounge area adjacent to the sanctuary. They are currently studying the minor prophets.

WEEKLY SMALL GROUPS

FEASTING ON THE WORD BIBLE STUDY

This Bible study group meets each Monday evening at 7:00 in the church kitchen. The focus of study is the pastor's scripture passage for the coming Sunday.

WOMEN'S BIBLE STUDY

This study meets every Wednesday morning, from 9:30-11:00, in the Party Room at Heritage Pointe.

SEASONAL SMALL GROUPS

Intentional Faith Development groups are formed each fall and winter, meeting for

approximately 10 sessions each season. It is the goal of each group to provide an environment in which participants can experience authentic community and spiritual growth in



an open, non-threatening setting.
