

Administrative Council

The Solid Rock Administrative Council met on August 18. At this meeting, the Council learned from the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee that Norma Smith has been given the responsibilities of office manager to relieve some of Pastor Kathy Newton's workload.

Architect Brian Hollars will present a building plan update to the congregation on August 23. The congregation will vote on August 30 to determine if a capital funds campaign will take place this fall.

The worship service on September 6 will take place at 10:00 at the Knight-Bergman Center. A community breakfast will be served from 8:00 to 9:30.

The youth group is meeting on the first and third Sundays of each month. They will split into junior high and high school groups for discussions.

The Lay Leadership (Nominations) Committee presented a slate of proposed officers for 2010.

Pastor Kathy presented an "off-site" ministry opportunity for the Council's consideration. The Lightning Five building, including all appliances, is available for rent. Pastor Kathy would like to see Solid Rock develop a ministry at a second, less "church-like" location, providing an environment which would be attractive to youth and young adults. Council unanimously agreed that Pastor Kathy and others from the church should continue to investigate the possibility of using this site for expanded ministry.

Joenita Keller reported that Perry Spahr will teach a new seventh-eighth grade class. Junior high and high school students have been meeting together, but there are now enough junior high students to establish a separate class. Sunday school promotion will be August 30.

Several have expressed interest in participating in a missions trip to Henderson Settlement. The cost would be \$30 per day for food and lodging. Oma Zent will pursue planning for this trip.

What's in a name?

Another school year has begun, and the guessing about students' names is one of the first challenges each teacher faces. Not only is the pronunciation of unfamiliar surnames an issue, but also the thought, "Did this child's parent have any idea the cross the student with a non-traditional given name would bear throughout his or her academic years?"

My own daughters, through no fault of their own, have no middle names. Don't ask Who knows what was in my head fifty years ago. They have bemoaned their fate since the first day of kindergarten, and with each subsequent, new teacher. Every time they encountered a new form or a situation where they had to give their middle names or even a middle initial it was a situation needing an assurance of the lack thereof. One finally gave herself a middle name and used it on all records the rest of her school career. With the other, on her 16th birthday I offered to do the paperwork and take her to court to legally change her name

Some incidents encountered through the years come to mind: a boy, whose real name was Chip, battled the taunts of playground bullies every year because he was expected to endure being hounded by "potato Chip" or "Chip and dip"; a mother explained to me she named her kindergarten daughter "Modess" because she saw the name on a box when she was shopping and thought it so pretty; in another class, a child was named "Phillip Morris," and one boy, named Lincoln, was always teased because he "was not a Lincoln, but only a Ford or a VW beetle."

This year's classes offer up the following: I have six girls in the third grade who are named Kaley, Kailey, Kayley, Kaileigh, Kayleigh, Kaylee. Just trying to remember which ones have the first syllable rhyming with "may" or "my" is about the only thing I focus on during the therapy periods; Samuel's name is pronounced "Samwell"; if I were a gambler, my bet would be that Cael's name would be mispronounced by a majority of guessers, the first time around, but no one would have difficulty knowing how to say "Writey," as a second grade boy is named.

A related challenge for teachers who become parents is to try to find a suitable name when welcoming a new baby to the family. The choices are always tainted by former students who managed to take the teachers to the limits of patience throughout their time together. How fortunate my girls were named, even though incompletely, before I began teaching. Can you imagine how many names I would have to avoid after 50 years as a teacher?

Sam Bradford's strategy for success

Since the game's inception, hundreds of thousands of young men have played collegiate football, but only 74 hold the distinction of winning the Heisman Trophy. As a sophomore, Sam Bradford joins Tim Tebow as the youngest ever to be inducted into this exclusive group of gridiron stars.

"I played a million different sports when I was growing up. I started when I was probably five or six and we'd just go from activity to activity to activity," Sam said. "I think, finally my parents just realized that we were missing something in our lives. They realized that it was time for us as a family to start going to church."

Sam enjoyed going to church, and before long he made a decision that would affect the rest of his life. "I remember going every Sunday morning, just listening and learning more about the Lord. Probably after a couple of months, I really decided that I wanted to give my life to the Lord."

As a quarterback for one of the top college football programs in the country, Sam faces enormous pressure. To deal with it, he turns to the Bible for direction. "That can be a humbling experience, knowing that the weight of the team is on your shoulders. How do you deal with that?" Sam said. "That's something that I really had to deal with - not just leading the team and that pressure; but also the pressure that comes with being in college and having to go to class and keeping your grades up. I value academics. I take class really serious. So. trying to deal with football, academics, being a leader on this team, not just a part of this team [is a lot]. I think God, when you spend time with Him, and the more you read, the more He shows you by example what it is to be a leader."

One of those times came the night before his first game as a starter. Sitting in his hotel room he opened the Bible and read the story of David and Goliath.

"I read it and I really felt confident when I took the field knowing that He was right there behind me. It was something that just kind of happened to become a tradition and it's something I do before every game now. The thing that I just love about that story is that David went out there and he didn't go out there as David. He went out there as David with God and through God. I think it just proves that you're so much stronger when you do things through God, and when you live through Him than when you try to do things on your own."

One season later Sam won the most prestigious award in college football, the 2008 Heisman Trophy, as quarterback for the University of Oklahoma.
